# Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) Policy

The Pines Primary School is an inclusive school. We take safeguarding very seriously and our policies are developed with a high priority on children's safety and in the light of our safeguarding policy. All our school policies are interlinked and should be read and informed by other policies. In particular, the SEND policy is linked to behaviour, anti-bullying, medical, lettings and curriculum policies.

This SEND policy is written to comply with the 2014 Children and Families Act, SEND Code of Practice 0-25, together with the Equality Act 2010.

Inquiries about an individual child's progress should be addressed at first to the class teacher since he or she is the person who knows the child best. Other enquiries can be addressed to the SENDCo (Clare Warwick).

We aim to work closely with parents and children to ensure that we take into account the child's own views and aspirations and the parents' experience of, and hopes for, their child. Parents are invited to be involved at every stage of planning and reviewing SEND provision for their child.

All pupils are entitled to a broad and balanced curriculum, and we have high expectations of all our children. Our aim is that children on our SEND register make progress which compares well with (or exceeds) the progress made by other children in school.

All children benefit from 'Quality First Teaching': this means that teachers expect to assess, plan and teach all children at the level which allows them to make progress with their learning. In addition, we implement some focused interventions to target particular skills or barriers to learning.

# Our School objectives are:

- To identify, at the earliest possible opportunity, barriers to learning and participation for pupils with SEND (see also curriculum and assessment policies).
- To ensure that every child experiences success in their learning and achieves to the highest possible standard.
- To enable all children to participate in lessons fully and effectively.
- To value and encourage the contribution of all children to the life of the school.
- To work in partnership with parents.
- To work with the Governing Body to enable them to fulfil their statutory monitoring role with regard to the SEND policy and SEN Information report.
- To work closely with external support agencies, where appropriate, to support the need of individual pupils.
- To ensure that all staff have access to training and advice to support quality teaching and learning for all pupils.

### **Defining SEND**

The 2015 Code of Practice says that:

A child or young person has SEN if they have a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for him or her.

A child of compulsory school age or a young person has a learning difficulty or disability if he or she:

- has a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age, or
- has a disability which prevents or hinders him or her from making use of facilities of a kind generally provided for others of the same age in mainstream schools.

Under the Equality Act 2010, a disability is '...a physical or mental impairment which has a long-term and substantial adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities'. This definition includes sensory impairments such as those affecting sight or hearing, and long-term health conditions.

# **Identifying children for SEND Support**

The needs of pupils with SEND are identified under four broad areas, although we recognise that pupils will often have needs associated with more than one area:

Communication and Interaction

Cognition and Learning

Social, Emotional and Mental Health

Sensory and Physical

Children with SEND are identified by one of two assessment routes both of which are part of the overall approach to monitoring progress of all pupils:

- The progress of every child is monitored at termly pupil progress meetings. If children are identified as not making progress, despite Quality First Teaching, they are discussed with the SENDCo and Headteacher and a plan of action is agreed.
- Class teachers are continually aware of children's learning. If they observe that a child, as
  recommended by the 2015 Code of Practice, is making less than expected progress, given
  their age and individual circumstances, they will seek to identify a cause. This can be
  characterised by progress which:
  - is significantly slower than that of their peers starting from the same baseline.
  - fails to match or better the child's previous rate of progress.
  - fails to close the attainment gap between the child and their peers.

Although the school can identify special educational needs, and make provision to meet those needs, we do not offer diagnosis. Parents are advised to contact their GP for advice on diagnostic routes.

The school also gathers information from parents when children start school, either through transition meetings or home visits.

# **Working with Parents and Children**

We aim to have good and informative relationships with all our parents. If a child is experiencing difficulties, parents will be informed either at parents' meetings (Autumn and Spring terms) or during informal meetings to discuss the child's progress.

All children who have been identified with a special educational need will have a one-page profile and school support plan. Individual learning targets are agreed between the family and teacher and then reviewed each term at meetings with the class teacher and SENDCo.

This is part of the graduated approach cycle of 'Assess, Plan, Do, Review 'required in the Code of Practice. This is an ongoing cycle to enable the provision to be reviewed and revised as the needs of the pupil change and or develop. This cycle enables the identification of those actions which are the most effective in supporting the pupil to achieve good progress and outcomes.

Children are encouraged to share their views through writing a 'One Page profile' along with their Class Teacher and Family. One page profiles are a person-centred approach tool used so that everyone involved with the child is able to clearly see their likes, ambitions and successes but also their individual targets and support strategies.

# Moving to an EHCP (Education, Health and Care Plan)

If children fail to make progress, despite high quality, targeted support, we may apply for the child to be assessed for an EHC Plan. The plan is a legal document that describes the needs of the pupil, the provision that will be put in place, and the outcomes sought.

Having a diagnosis (e.g. of ASD, ADHD or dyslexia) does not mean that a child needs an EHC Plan.

If the application for an EHC Plan is successful, a member of the Local Authority will collate paperwork, reports and information collected from parents, the child and the school together with any health or social care professionals who are involved with the family. This will record the child's strengths, their aspirations as well as the barriers they face. The LA will produce the EHC Plan.

#### **Teaching and Learning**

We believe that all children learn best with the rest of their class. Our aim is for all children to be working independently, in class, at the cusp of their potential. Children with SEN and disabilities are entitled to be taught by their teacher, not always by a TA. Teachers aim to spend time each day working with all children with SEND, individually or as part of a group.

When allocating additional TA support to children, our focus is on outcomes, not hours: we aim to put in sufficient support to enable the child to reach their personalised targets, but without developing a learned dependence on an adult.

The school is developing a range of interventions which are designed to meet specific learning needs.

Targets for children with SEND support are deliberately challenging in the attempt to close the attainment gap between the children and their peers. Interventions are often crucial in closing these gaps, so are monitored closely by both the class teacher who monitors progress towards the targets.

- Interventions are planned in six to eight week blocks
- At the beginning of each block a baseline assessment is completed. At the end of each block, children's progress against their target and baseline is assessed and recorded.
- A decision is them made as to whether to continue the intervention, to swap to a new intervention, or to allow a period of consolidation in class.

#### Adaptations to the curriculum teaching and Learning environment

The Pines is a disability friendly school. We hope that no additional adaptations to the building are necessary for children with physical disabilities however reasonable and appropriate adaptions will be made in line with Education and Health Care Plans or advice from specialists to accommodate children with other sensory needs or disabilities.

All our children access the full National Curriculum, and we recognise achievement and expertise in all curricular areas. As part of normal class differentiation curriculum, content and ideas can be made more accessible by using visual, tactile and concrete resources, when necessary.

#### Access to extra-curricular activities

All children have equal access to school clubs which develop engagement with the wider curriculum. Where necessary, we make accommodation and adaptation to meet the physical and learning needs of our children. Class trips are part of our curriculum and we aim for all children to benefit from them. No child is excluded from a trip because of SEN, disability or medical needs.

# **Staff Expertise**

All teachers are trained to work with children with SEND. Some are very experienced, and others less so, but all have access to advice, information, resources and training to enable them to teach all children effectively. We offer training and self-help opportunities through access to in-house or external courses, provision of resources or guidance towards useful websites.

We will request support from external advisors were required (including Psychologists and Specialist Support Teachers).

#### Children with social, emotional and mental health needs

Whilst behaviour is not classified as a SEND, we have a holistic approach to supporting the behaviour and wellbeing of all our pupils. We believe that "behaviour is a form of communication and as such, children are supported in trying to understand their behaviour and develop strategies to manage difficulties positively" (Well-being and Behaviour Policy).

All behaviour is responded to consistently in line with our Well-being and Behaviour Policy and reasonable adjustments are made to accommodate individual needs. If a child shows consistent antisocial behaviours, the class teacher will assess the child's needs, considering family circumstances and the child's known history of experiences.

Within school, we offer a variety of support for SEMH needs and will discuss with parents the opportunities available. Mrs Rachael Cox is our Family Wellbeing Lead and offers 1:1 wellbeing support for children experiencing emotional difficulties and Miss Louise Nickerson is our ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant) Lead.

If parents and school are concerned that the child may have mental health needs, we encourage parents to ask their GP for a referral to CAMHS.

The school has a zero-tolerance approach to bullying, especially towards children with SEND and disabilities.

# **Transition Arrangements**

We understand how difficult it is for children and parents as they move into a new class or a new school and will do what we can, according to the individual needs of the child, to make transitions between classes, including into and from the Early Years, as smooth as possible. This may include, for example:

- Additional meetings for the parents and child with the new teacher
- Additional visits to the classroom environment to identify where the toilets are, where the pegs are etc.
- Opportunities to take photographs of key people and places to make a transition booklet.

Enhanced transition arrangements are tailored to meet individual needs.

### **Governors/Trust**

It is the statutory duty of the governors to ensure that the school follows its responsibilities to meet the needs of children with SEND following the requirements of the Code of Practice 2015.

Camilla Saunders - Director of Inclusion is responsible for overseeing SEND across Anglian Learning.

#### **Complaints**

The school will work, wherever possible, in partnership with parents to ensure a collaborative approach to meeting pupils' needs.

All complaints are taken seriously, and the Trust aims to deal with complaints informally where possible, at the earliest possible stage (Complaints Policy and Procedure).

#### The Local Offer

The purpose of the Local Offer is to enable parents and young people to see more clearly what services are available in their area and how to access them. It includes provision from birth to 25, across education, health and social care. The Suffolk Local Offer is available from the website;
