#### Literacy:

We will continue to learn our phonics sounds. We will support the children to learn to read independently and build on their understanding of texts. The children will also learn about writing captions and simple sentences. We will enjoy texts such as; 'Whatever Next!' and 'How to catch a star!'

#### Maths:

We will learn about the value and order of numbers to 20 using resources such as Numicon. The children will then move on to learning about addition and subtraction. We will also develop our knowledge about weight and capacity.

#### Personal, Social and Emotional Development:

We will learn about how to set a goal for ourselves. We will also learn about how sleep is good for our bodies and how we can make healthy choices.

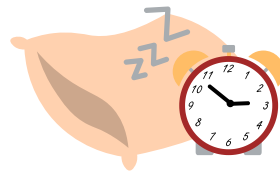
#### Expressive Arts and Design:

#### Language and Communication:

We will be learning about how to ask and answer questions.

#### Physical Development:
